Hello Lexington Emmaus Community,

It's the opening line to a book: It was the best of times, It was the worst of times. For many of our countrymen and those around the world, if it is not the worst of times, it is pretty close. Sights of lines of thousands of people waiting to get a food box from their local food pantry have been pretty disheartening. The heavy disruption of so many lives. So many events of value to so many people canceled, sporting events to Emmaus Walks. Stories of those trying to take advantage of the situation by scamming and stealing hurt my heart and soul.

The stories of creativity, love and devotion to duty in spite of personal peril have been awe-inspiring. These stories tell of the best of the people around us. There have been



days that I paced the house and yard like a caged tiger, wanting-needing to contribute somehow. Most days I am discouraged that the main role that I am playing in the whole situation is trying to not get sick and to not bring something home to my wife.

We have been watching our church services on YouTube Sunday mornings. On Easter morning, my wife and I got up well before dawn. Went to a place where we could see the sun come up over the horizon instead of over the roof of the neighbor's house around noon. We read the Crucifixion/Resurrection story out loud and shared a meal of bread and wine together. Watched the sun come up. And celebrated the empty tomb!

It can be a little weird the things you notice when you are in an unusual life situation. I normally work from home. I may not leave the house except to walk the dog and go to church for a week or more in normal times. When I do go out to visit clients, I wear a specific set of socks. I don't know why; I just always have. I did a full load of laundry last weekend. No work socks in the hamper. Really brought home the social isolation of the past few weeks.

I do not know when we will be able to gather together again. Even if social distancing guidance was lifted tomorrow, I think I would be reluctant to gather into large groups right away. It is my sincerest hope that we can come together by the first Friday of June.

Stay safe. Pray for those around you. Pray for those on the other side of the world.
